## REFLECTIONS

### JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY | OCTOBER 23, 2016 | THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Today's Gospel graces us with a beautiful prayer that can make every day of our lives a jubilee of mercy: "O God, be merciful to me a sinner" (Luke 18:13). Religious Israelites despised the tax collector who prayed it, for collaborating with Gentile occupiers and handling currency that bore the "divine" emperor's graven image. But the Pharisee's long-winded self-congratulation, mixed with self-righteous condemnation, was no "prayer" at all. "The Pharisee . . . spoke this prayer to himself" (18:11, emphasis added). Praying the tax collector's simple, sincere, succinct cry for mercy acknowledges our own sinfulness, and "welcomes" other sinners as brothers and sisters with whom we can identify, even empathize, echoing Pope Francis' famous comment about not being the one to judge. Indeed, the tax collector "went home justified" (18:14), that is, restored to God's friendship, for God's mercy is not prize achieved but gift received. "Let your prayer be brief: for tax collector, prodigal son, and dying thief were all reconciled to God by a single phrase!" (Saint John Climacus, 7th century).

### QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK | THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

*Theme: God knows and sees our hearts.*

**Breaking Open the Word** - Suggested text for faith sharing: Today's Gospel

**Step One: Listen to the Word:** As you hear the word proclaimed today, what word or phrase strikes you? In this parable, what image comes to mind for you?

**Step Two: Look into Your Life:** QUESTION FOR CHILDREN: Jesus teaches us to be humble – but what does that mean? How do you show you are humble? QUESTION FOR YOUTH: God knows when we are doing things just for show, and when they come from the goodness of our heart. When have you caught yourself doing something just to be more popular or liked? How does it feel to do something that you know is good and just? QUESTION FOR ADULTS: This Gospel reading suggests that we approach God and each other with humility. What does this mean, in practical terms? How do we "humble" ourselves? What does that mean?

#### "I MUST DECREASE" (Jn 3:30)

Jesus "spoke this parable addressed to those who believed in their own self-righteousness..." —Luke 18:9

The Pharisee's piety was admirable. He tithed ten percent of his gross income. He fasted two days a week, probably a very severe fast. How many of us tithe and fast to that extent? However, St. Luke points out specifically that his "prayer" was directed to himself, not to God (Lk 18:11, JB, RSV-CE). He compared his virtue to the standards of other people, not to the standards of God.

The tax collector's piety was not admirable. The tax collectors of Jesus' time were Jews who worked for the Romans. They routinely extorted their own people to get a better commission. Perhaps this was the only time this man had even been to the Temple. But this tax collector possessed the vision to see his own lowliness before God. He also avoided comparing himself to others. Instead, He compared his own sinful life to the holiness of God, and cast himself upon the mercy of God (Lk 18:13).

In today's second reading, St. Paul seems to resemble the Pharisee more than the tax collector. He "boasts" about how he, too, has been faithful to God (see 2 Tm 4:7). However, St. Paul's comments were a testimony to the Lord's faithfulness rather than a litany of self-praise meant for God to overhear. Paul gives credit to God for any good he has done. The Pharisee gives credit to himself, rejecting God's goodness in his life.

Any good thing in our lives is God's doing (Phil 2:13). "Name something you have that you have not received," particularly a spiritual talent or gift. "If, then, you have received it, why are you boasting as if it were your own?" (1 Cor 4:7)

**Prayer:** Jesus, You "must increase, while I must decrease" (Jn 3:30).

**Promise:** "The Lord redeems the lives of His servants." —Ps 34:23

**Praise:** Praise Jesus, Redeemer, Messiah, and risen King!

### TO BE A CHRISTIAN STEWARD

#### A Summary of the U.S. Bishops' Pastoral Letter on Stewardship

**"As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace" (1 Pt 4:10).**

What identifies a steward? Safeguarding material and human resources and using them responsibly are one answer; so is generous giving of time, talent, and treasure. But being a Christian steward means more. As Christian stewards, we receive God's gifts gratefully, cultivate them responsibly, share them lovingly in justice with others, and return them with increase to the Lord.

1. **Disciples as Stewards**
2. **Stewards of Creation**
3. **Stewards of Vocation**

### STEWARDS OF THE CHURCH

Stewards of God's gifts are not passive beneficiaries. We cooperate with God in our own redemption and in the redemption of others. We are also obliged to be stewards of the Church—collaborators and cooperators in continuing the redemptive work of Jesus Christ, which is the Church's essential mission. This mission—proclaiming and teaching, serving and sanctifying—is our task. It is the personal responsibility of each one of us as stewards of the Church. All members of the Church have their own roles to play in carrying out its mission:

- Parents, who nurture their children in the light of faith;
- Parishioners, who work in concrete ways to make their parishes true communities of faith and vibrant sources of service to the larger community;
- All Catholics, who give generous support—time, money, prayers, and personal service according to their circumstances—to parish and diocesan programs
- and to the universal Church.

### OBSTACLES TO STEWARDSHIP

People who want to live as Christian disciples and Christian stewards face serious obstacles. In the United States and other nations, a dominant secular culture often contradicts religious convictions about the meaning of life. This culture frequently encourages us to focus on ourselves and our pleasures.

At times, we can find it far too easy to ignore spiritual realities and to deny religion a role in shaping human and social values. As Catholics who have entered into the mainstream of American society and experienced its advantages, many of us also have been adversely influenced by this secular culture. We know what it is to struggle against selfishness and greed, and we realize that it is harder for many today to accept the challenge of being a Christian steward. It is essential, therefore, that we make a special effort to understand the true meaning of stewardship and live accordingly.

### A STEWARD'S WAY

The life of a Christian steward models the life of Jesus. It is challenging and even difficult, in many respects, yet intense joy comes to those who take the risk to live as Christian stewards. Women and men who seek to live as stewards learn that "all things work for good for those who love God" (Rom 8:28).

After Jesus, we look to Mary as an ideal steward. As the Mother of Christ, she lived her ministry in a spirit of fidelity and service; she responded generously to the call. We must ask ourselves: Do we also wish to be disciples of Jesus Christ and Christian stewards of our world and our Church? Central to our human and Christian vocations, as well as to the unique vocation each one of us receives from God, is that we be good stewards of the gifts we possess. God gives us this divine-human workshop, this world and Church of ours.

The Spirit shows us the way.

Stewardship is a part of that journey.

### "QUE YO DISMINUYA" (JUAN 3:30)

"Y refiriéndose a algunos que se tenían por justos y despreciaban a los demás, dijo también esta parábola:" (Lucas 18, 9).

La piedad del fariseo era admirable: aportaba el diez por ciento de su ingreso bruto y ayunaba dos días a la semana, probablemente un ayuno muy arduo. ¿Cuántos de nosotros damos el diezmo y ayunamos por tal o cual motivo? Sin embargo, san Lucas señala específicamente que la "oración" del fariseo se dirigía a sí mismo y no a Dios (Lc 18, 11). Comparó sus virtudes con la conducta de otras personas, no con los estándares de Dios.

La piedad de los tributos no era admirable. Los cobradores de impuestos del tiempo de Jesús eran judíos que trabajaban para los romanos. Muchas veces extorsionaban a su propia gente para ganarse una mejor comisión. Tal vez esta fue la única vez que este publicano de la parábola había estado en el templo. Pero este publicano poseía la visión de ver su propia pequeñez ante Dios. También evitó compararse con los demás. En cambio, sí comparó su propia vida de pecado con la santidad de Dios, y se arrojó en manos de la misericordia de Dios (Lc 18, 13).

En la segunda lectura de hoy, san Pablo parece asemejarse al fariseo más que el recaudador de impuestos. Nos "cuenta" cómo él también ha sido fiel a Dios (ver 2 Tim 4, 7). Sin embargo, los comentarios de san Pablo eran un testimonio de la fidelidad del Señor en lugar de una larga lista de auto-elogios para que Dios escuchara. Pablo da crédito a Dios por cualquier bien que ha hecho. El fariseo se da crédito a sí mismo, rechazando la buena obra de Dios en su vida.

Cualquier cosa buena en nuestras vidas ha sido obra de Dios (Fil 2, 13). Nombra, si puedes, algo "que tengas y no hayas recibido", un talento o don espiritual. "Y si lo has recibido, ¿por qué te glorías como si no lo hubieras recibido?" (1 Co 4, 7).

**Oración:** Jesús, que Tú "crezcas y que yo disminuya" (Jn 3, 30).

**Promesa:** "Pero el Señor rescata a sus servidores" (Sal 34, 23).

**Alabanza:** ¡Alaba a Jesús, el Redentor, el Mesías y Rey resucitado!
