PERFECT TIMING

"Stay with us. It is nearly evening — the day is practically over." —Luke 24:29

The Jewish people of Jesus' time measured their days not from morning to night but from evening to evening. Thus, Jesus began the day of His death with the Last Supper, the first Mass, and He ended the day of His resurrection with the second Mass. After a Liturgy of the Word (lasting for the time it takes to walk about seven miles), Jesus "took bread, pronounced the blessing, then broke the bread and began to distribute it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized Him" (Lk 24:30-31).

The early Church realized that Jesus' timing of the first two Masses (Eucharists) was very significant. Led by the Spirit (Jn 16:13), they devoted themselves to the breaking of the bread, that is, the Mass (Acts 2:42). Wherever the Church has emphasized devotion to the Mass throughout its history, it has seen the love, power, and glory of God.

Therefore, let us fully enter into the Sunday celebration of the Mass. May it be the center of our Sunday and of our life. Let us pray the Mass daily or as often as possible. Let us visit the Blessed Sacrament frequently. A life eucharistically centered is a life centered on the crucified and risen Christ.

Prayer: Father, teach me to pray and live the Mass.

Promise: "Realize that you were delivered from the futile way of life your fathers handed on to you, not by any diminishable sum of silver or gold, but by Christ's blood beyond all price: the blood of a spotless, unblemished Lamb chosen before the world's foundation and revealed for your sake in these last days." —1 Pt 1:18-20

Praise: Praise to You risen Lord Jesus, King of heaven and earth!

FULFILLING A MISSION | Henri Nouwen Society

When we live our lives as missions, we become aware that there is a home from where we are sent and to where we have to return. We start thinking about ourselves as people who are in a faraway country to bring a message or work on a project, but only for a certain amount of time. When the message has been delivered and the project is finished, we want to return home to give an account of our mission and to rest from our labours.

One of the most important spiritual disciplines is to develop the knowledge that the years of our lives are years "on a mission."

Each of us has a mission in life. Jesus prays to his Father for his followers, saying: "As you sent me into the world, I have sent them into the world" (John 17:18).

We seldom realize fully that we are sent to fulfill God-given tasks. We act as if we have to choose how, where, and with whom to live. We act as if we were simply plopped down in creation and have to decide how to entertain ourselves until we die. But we were sent into the world by God, just as Jesus was. Once we start living our lives with that conviction, we will soon know what we were sent to do.

Some monks and nuns trace their community origins back a thousand years or so, before it became customary to reserve the Blessed Sacrament in tabernacles. In their rules of life, which evolved from the lifestyle and prayer of their predecessors, the core experience of Christ's presence is at the altar itself, and in the symbol of assembly for prayer. To this day, when the monks or nuns file into their church in procession, they march two by two, and then bow profoundly to the altar before turning and bowing in reverence toward the brother or sister at their side. It is probably more difficult, in practice, to revere the presence of Christ in a person who irks you by taking the car keys, shirking a work duty, or burning the toast!

We can trace in these religious orders' enduring customs the ancient appreciation for the altar as the center of the church building, and of the community of the faithful as the Body of Christ. Usually, a monastery today will reserve the Blessed Sacrament in some quiet corner of the monastic church, in a fairly small space, more suitable for private prayer than for the gathering of the whole community. In a cloister, the architecture may allow the public limited access to this space. Liturgical law tells us, in both monasteries and parish churches, that there is no need for more than a few hosts in the place of reservation, just enough for viaticum, the "food for the journey" that is the final sacramental celebration for a dying Christian.

EN EL CAMINO — Una metáfora importante que se emplea para describir la vida cristiana es la de una peregrinación. En la segunda lectura de hoy, Pedro se dirige a la primera comunidad cristiana: "Vivan siempre con temor filial durante su peregrinar por la tierra" (1 Pedro 1:17). Al pensar en una peregrinación, normalmente se nos ocurre algún tipo de movimiento del punto A al punto B. La peregrinación cristiana, que comenzó en las aguas del bautismo (punto A) tiene como destino final la vida eterna con Dios en el cielo (punto B). Desafortunadamente, en el transcurso tomamos todo tipo de desvíos. Debido al pecado, tontamente nos desviamos y a veces parecemos incapaces de detectar la presencia del Señor. Hoy, el relato de los dos discípulos camino a Emaús ilustra el hecho de que, aunque nos sentamos abatidos o muy desviados, el Señor está allí, caminando junto a nosotros.

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TIEMPO PERFECTO

"Quédate con nosotros, porque ya es tarde y el día se acaba" (Lucas 24, 29).

El pueblo judío del tiempo de Jesús no medía los días desde la mañana hasta la noche, sino que de noche a noche. Por lo tanto, Jesús comenzó el día de su muerte con la Última Cena, la primera Misa y terminó el día de Su resurrección con la segunda Misa. Después de una Liturgia de la Palabra (que duró lo que toma caminar siete millas), Jesús "tomó pan, pronunció la bendición, lo partió y se lo dio. Entonces los ojos de los discípulos se abrieron y lo reconocieron" (Lc 24, 30-31).

La Iglesia primitiva se dio cuenta que las dos primeras Misas (Eucaristías) de Jesús fueron muy significativas. Guiados por el Espíritu Santo (Jn 16, 13), ellos se dedicaron a la fracción del pan, que es, la Misa (Hch 2, 42). Dondequiera, la Iglesia ha enfatizado la devoción a la Misa a lo largo de la historia, se ha visto el amor, el poder y la gloria de Dios.

Por lo tanto, vamos a entrar de lleno en la celebración dominical de la Misa. Que este sea el centro de nuestro domingo y de nuestra vida. Participemos en la Misa diariamente o tan a menudo como sea posible. Visitemos el Santísimo frecuentemente. Una vida centrada eucarísticamente es una vida centrada en Cristo crucificado y resucitado.

Oración: Padre, enséñame a orar y a vivir la Misa.

Promesa: "Ustedes saben que fueron rescatados de la vana conducta heredada de sus padres, no con bienes corruptibles, como el oro y la plata, sino con la sangre preciosa de Cristo, el Cordero sin mancha y sin defecto, predestinado antes de la creación del mundo y manifestado en los últimos tiempos para bien de ustedes" (1 Pe 1, 18-20).
