Notice of Deadline for Filing Claims: October 1, 2024

YOU MAY HAVE A SEXUAL ABUSE CLAIM OR OTHER CLAIM AGAINST THE DIOCESE OF SACRAMENTO

On April 1, 2024, The Roman Catholic Bishop of Sacramento aka Diocese of Sacramento filed a chapter 11 bankruptcy petition for protection under title 11 of the United States Code.

If you were sexually abused by any person connected with the Diocese, you must file a claim so as to be received by October 1, 2024, or otherwise you will be forever barred, estopped, and enjoined from asserting such claim against the Diocese.

Claims based on acts or omissions of the Diocese that occurred before April 1, 2024, must be filed on or before October 1, 2024, even if such claims are not now fixed, liquidated, or certain or did not mature or become fixed, liquidated, or certain before April 1, 2024.

A Churchgoer wrote a letter to a newspaper editor and complained that it made no sense to go to church every Sunday. "I've gone for 30 years now," he wrote, "and in that time I have heard something like 3,000 sermons. But for the life of me, I can't remember a single one of them. So, I think I'm wasting my time, and the pastors are wasting theirs by giving sermons at all." This started a real controversy in the "Letters to the Editor" column, much to the delight of the editor. It went on for weeks until someone wrote this clincher: "I've been married for 30 years now. In that time my wife cooked some 32,000 meals. But, for the life of me, I cannot recall the entire menu for one of those meals. But I do know this. They all nourished me and gave me the strength I needed to do my work. If my wife had not given me these meals, I would be physically dead today. Likewise, if I had not gone to Church for nourishment, I would be spiritually dead today!"

The main theme of today's readings is that Christian life is a series of daily choices for God or against God, as we choose to live out or reject the truths He has revealed through His prophets in the Old Testament and especially through His Son Jesus in the New Testament. The readings remind us that the fundamental choice we make determines how we live our lives. Joshua, in our first reading, Paul, in the second reading, and Jesus in the Gospel, make similar challenges to the people to make their choice. Today we, too, are challenged to decide Whom we will serve as our God.

In our first reading, taken from the book of Joshua, the leader who succeeded Moses, Joshua challenges the Israelites who have entered the Promised Land to make a choice and to reaffirm their Covenant relationship with Yahweh. By that time (12th century B.C.), the Promised Land had been divided up among the tribes of Israel. But a big concern is whether the tribes will drift away from the worship of the God of Israel. So before departing from them in death, Joshua gathers the tribal leaders around him to issue his last words of advice. They gather at Shechem, 40 miles north of Jerusalem, where God first appeared to Abraham and promised to make Abraham's descendants a great nation (Gn 12:6ff and 33:18ff), a fitting place for the renewal of the Covenant. Joshua reminds the people of what God has done for them in rescuing them from slavery in Egypt, providing for their survival in the desert and giving them victory over their enemies. God has been their Deliverer, Provider, and Protector. This is the God that Joshua calls Lord and with Whom he wants to be covenanted. Joshua's challenge to the Israelites is to decide, then and there, whom they will serve, the gods of their fathers, the gods of the Amorites among whom they now live, or this God Who has done so much for them. They must decide *for the God of Israel* or *to reject Him* in favor of the idols of their fathers and neighbors. Their decision for God should be reflected in their fidelity to the terms of the Covenant, i.e. the Law. Then Joshua sets the example for the rest of Israelites: "*As for me and my household, we will serve the LORD.*" Joshua's challenge prefigures the choice the apostles must make in today's Gospel. We, too, are asked today whether or not we choose to remain in discipleship to Jesus.

In this second reading, Paul, writing to the Ephesians, gives us the criteria for our daily moral choices in the family, parish, school, community, and civil society. He wants the Ephesians to use in all spheres of Christian life the criteria for the relationship of a successful marriage. In addition, he uses the image of marriage to describe the relationship that should exist among believers. Those who enter into the Covenant of marriage should love and submit to one another in mutual care and respect, just as Christ submitted himself in loving sacrifice for the Church. Paul wants the Ephesians to accept, love, mutually respect, and serve each other, recognizing the true dignity of each member of Christ, and to use that as the norm for all their relationships, both in the family and in their Faith community. Paul also reminds them, and reminds us, that Jesus nourishes the members of the Church through the Eucharist, making us His own flesh and blood, as husband and wife become one flesh. So, the norms of our every relationship must be acceptance, love, mutual respect, and service and, as the foundation of these, the recognition of the true dignity of each member of Christ. Our choices in family life and parish life should be guided by this high ideal.

"*This teaching is difficult. Who can accept it?*" It was Jesus' disciples who made this complaint. They were offended by Jesus' language – eating his Flesh and drinking his Blood to have Life eternal, the imagery and the metaphors Jesus used in the Eucharistic discourse. This was the Master's dramatic way of saying that we must accept totally, without any conditions or reservations everything Jesus tells us. Jesus' thoughts and attitudes, values, and life-view must become totally ours. Above all we are to identify with Jesus in the offering of His Flesh and the pouring out of His Blood on the cross, the ultimate expression of God's unutterable love for us. But without giving any further explanation, Jesus simply challenges them to open themselves to the gift of Faith that God is offering them: "*No one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father*" (v. 65). Jesus tries to help the remaining followers to make a leap of Faith, because it is only with Faith that they will be able to see and grasp the triple mystery which has been revealed to them, namely, (1) the Incarnation (*I am the Bread that came down from Heaven*, 6:41); (2) the redemption (*the Bread that I give is my Flesh for the life of the world*, 6:51); (3) the Ascension and glorification (*the Son of Man will ascend to where He was before*, 6:62). Having insisted earlier that the believer must eat the Flesh and drink the Blood of the Son of Man to have eternal life, Jesus now tells the disciples "The flesh is of no avail." But "flesh" here is not the Eucharist. Rather, "flesh" means natural sustenance, assumptions, attitudes, and expectations, which cannot give spiritual nourishment. And the "Spirit" here means the life-giving Holy Spirit Who will be given to believers after Jesus' ascent into Heaven. Peter's response to Jesus' question, "*Do you also want to leave?*" "Is the simple question, "*Master, to whom we shall go? You have the words of eternal life.*" The question reflects the Faith-filled, free, whole-hearted decision of the apostles and the early Christian community to follow Jesus in complete, accepting obedience and trust.

We Christians have accepted the challenge of following the way of Christ and making choices for Christ, fortified by the Bread Jesus gives and relying on the power of the Holy Spirit. The Heavenly Bread and the Holy Spirit will give us the courage of our Christian convictions to accept the Church's teachings and to face ridicule, criticisms, and even social isolation for our adherence to sound Christian principles in our lives. Above all, we are to identify with Jesus in his Self-gift of God's Love for us, his Crucifixion, death and Resurrection, sealing the New Covenant with all mankind in His Blood, a Self-gift of Love extended to us in the Eucharist with Jesus' Body and Blood becoming our spiritual Food and Drink. May God bless you all. Amen.

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

Young adults (older than 18) are invited to participate in this pilgrimage. Renew your faith as we visit these special places and grow in friendship. Tour leaves from SFO.

Day 1: Saturday, July 12, 2025 • Departure

Our journey begins as we board our trans-Atlantic flight for Rome, Italy.

Day 2: Sunday, July 13, 2025 • Rome

Upon arrival at the airport, we meet our guide and driver and transfer to our hotel. We have the day to relax after our flight, explore on our own or attend Mass. Later we enjoy a welcome dinner at a Roman restaurant. L, D

Day 3: Monday, July 14, 2025 • Rome

After breakfast, we begin our sightseeing in the Eternal City of Rome and see the glories of the Caesars. We become acquainted with the city that was the birthplace for much of our civilization as we visit the Capitoline Hill area, from which we view the Roman Forum and see Mamertine Prison where Paul wrote many of his New Testament letters. We also see the Colosseum, Constantine's Arch, and more. This afternoon we visit the oldest of the four major Basilicas in Rome, and the home to the relics of Peter and Paul, the Basilica of St. John the Lateran. This Basilica is where Pope Francis was installed as Bishop of Rome, and where he officiates as the

Bishop of Rome. Next, we cross the street to visit the Holy Staircase. Tradition states that this staircase is from Pontius Pilate's palace of Jerusalem during the time of Jesus. To conclude your day, we proceed to the Basilica of St. Mary Major. This Basilica contains a relic from the Manger of the infant Jesus. B, L

Day 4: Tuesday, July 15, 2025 • Rome

This morning, we visit Vatican City and St. Peter's Cathedral, home of the Roman Catholic Church and the largest building in Christianity. Included is a visit to the Vatican Museums and the Sistine Chapel. This afternoon, we see the catacombs along the Appian Way, the traditional pilgrims' route followed by Peter and Paul. We visit one of the four major basilicas of Rome, St. Paul's Outside the Walls, where the Apostle was martyred and is buried. B, L

Day 5: Wednesday, July 16, 2025 • Lanciano

After an early breakfast we walk to the Vatican where we have a Papal Audience with the Holy Father. Then we depart for Lanciano for a short tour and then Mass at the Convent/Church of Saint Francis built on top of the antique Church of St. Longinus – the site of a Eucharistic Miracle that occurred in the eighth century. B, L

Day 6: Thursday, July 17, 2025 • Assisi

After an early breakfast, we depart for Assisi. Upon arrival, a local guide joins us as we explore the basilica with its wonderful frescoes by Cimabue and Giotto. We visit the Basilica of St. Clare, Francis' friend and foundress of the Poor Clare nuns, and see the crucifix that spoke to St. Francis in San Damiano. B, L

Day 7: Friday, July 18, 2025 • Assisi

We visit the Basilica of Santa Maria degli Angeli built to enclose the tiny Church of the Porziuncola. The church is St. Francis' first retreat and place of prayer, where he consecrated Clare as the Bride of Christ. Later we go to San Damiano to pray in the place where Francis wrote the "Canticle of the Sun." We also visit the tomb Blessed Carlo Acutis in the Church of St Mary Major in Assisi. B, L

Day 8: Saturday, July 19, 2025 • Milan

Today we depart for Milan where a local guide gives us a tour. We pray for the intercession of St. Ambrose and St. Charles Borromeo as we visit the sites of their tombs (the Basilica of St. Ambrogio and the spectacular Milan Cathedral, respectively)! En Route we stop for a short break in Bologna. B, L

Day 9: Sunday, July 20, 2025 • Milan

We take a day trip to Turin, the capital of the Piedmont region and home of the famous Shroud of Turin. This relic appears to bear the image of our crucified Lord. Years and years of research attest to its authenticity, and millions believe it to be the linen burial cloth on which Christ's face was miraculously permanently imprinted. We visit the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist where Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati, Patron Saint of World Youth Day is buried. We also see the Sanctuary of Maria Ausiliatrice, (the Basilica of Our Lady Help of Christians) and the Corpus Domini Basilica, the site of the 15th century Eucharistic miracle. We return to Milan for overnight and a farewell dinner. B, L,D

Day 10: Monday, July 21, 2025 • Return

Today we transfer to the airport for our return flight home. B

SACRAMENTOS Y MINISTERIOS

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Nuestra parroquia necesita tu apoyo
Gracias por su generosidad

Un feligrés escribió una carta al editor de un periódico y se quejaba de que no tenía sentido ir a la iglesia todos los domingos. “He ido durante 30 años”, escribió, “y en ese tiempo he escuchado algo así como 3.000 sermones. Pero por mi vida, no puedo recordar ni uno solo de ellos. Por lo tanto, creo que estoy perdiendo mi tiempo, y los pastores están perdiendo el suyo al dar sermones en absoluto”. Esto inició una verdadera controversia en la columna “Cartas al editor”, para gran deleite del editor. Continuó durante semanas hasta que alguien escribió esta frase decisiva: “He estado casado durante 30 años. En ese tiempo mi esposa cocinó unas 32.000 comidas. Pero por mi vida, no puedo recordar el menú completo de una de esas comidas. Pero sí sé esto. Todos me alimentaron y me dieron la fuerza que necesitaba para hacer mi trabajo. Si mi esposa no me hubiera dado estas comidas, hoy estaría físicamente muerto. Del mismo modo, si no hubiera ido a la Iglesia para alimentarme, ¡hoy estaría espiritualmente muerto!”.

El tema principal de las lecturas de hoy es que la vida cristiana es una serie de elecciones diarias a favor o en contra de Dios, al elegir vivir o rechazar las verdades que Él ha revelado a través de sus profetas en el Antiguo Testamento y especialmente a través de su Hijo Jesús en el Nuevo Testamento. Las lecturas nos recuerdan que la elección fundamental que hacemos determina cómo vivimos nuestras vidas. Josué, en nuestra primera lectura, Pablo, en la segunda lectura, y Jesús en el Evangelio, plantean desafíos similares al pueblo para que tome su decisión. Hoy también nosotros tenemos el desafío de decidir a Quién serviremos como nuestro Dios. En nuestra primera lectura, tomada del libro de Josué, el líder que sucedió a Moisés, Josué desafía a los israelitas que han entrado en la Tierra Prometida a hacer una elección y reafirmar su relación de Alianza con Yahvé. En ese momento (siglo XII a.C.), la Tierra Prometida ya había sido dividida entre las tribus de Israel. Pero una gran preocupación es si las tribus se alejarán de la adoración al Dios de Israel. Por eso, antes de alejarse de ellas en la muerte, Josué reúne a los líderes tribales a su alrededor para darles sus últimas palabras de consejo. Se reúnen en Siquem, a 40 millas al norte de Jerusalén, donde Dios se apareció por primera vez a Abraham y prometió hacer de sus descendientes una gran nación (Gn 12:6ss y 33:18ss), un lugar apropiado para la renovación de la Alianza. Josué recuerda al pueblo lo que Dios ha hecho por ellos al rescatarlos de la esclavitud en Egipto, proveer para su supervivencia en el desierto y darles la victoria sobre sus enemigos. Dios ha sido su Libertador, Proveedor y Protector. Este es el Dios al que Josué llama Señor y con Quien quiere hacer un pacto. El desafío de Josué a los israelitas es decidir, en ese momento y lugar, a quién servirán: a los dioses de sus padres, a los dioses de los amorreos entre los que ahora viven, o a este Dios que ha hecho tanto por ellos. Deben decidirse *por el Dios* de Israel o *rechazarlo* en favor de los ídolos de sus padres y vecinos. Su decisión por Dios debe reflejarse en su fidelidad a los términos de la Alianza, es decir, la Ley. Luego Josué da el ejemplo para el resto de los israelitas: “*En cuanto a mí y mi casa, serviremos al Señor*”. El desafío de Josué prefigura la elección que deben hacer los apóstoles en el Evangelio de hoy. A nosotros también se nos pregunta hoy si elegimos o no permanecer en el seguimiento de Jesús.

En esta segunda lectura, Pablo, escribiendo a los efesios, nos da los criterios para nuestras elecciones morales diarias en la familia, la parroquia, la escuela, la comunidad y la sociedad civil. Quiere que los efesios utilicen en todas las esferas de la vida cristiana los criterios para la relación de un matrimonio exitoso. Además, utiliza la imagen del matrimonio para describir la relación que debe existir entre los creyentes. Quienes entran en la alianza del matrimonio deben amarse y someterse unos a otros en mutuo cuidado y respeto, tal como Cristo se sometió en sacrificio amoroso por la Iglesia. Pablo quiere que los efesios se acepten, se amen, se respeten mutuamente y se sirvan, reconociendo la verdadera dignidad de cada miembro de Cristo, y que utilicen eso como norma para todas sus relaciones, tanto en la familia como en su comunidad de fe. Pablo también les recuerda, y nos recuerda a nosotros, que Jesús nutre a los miembros de la Iglesia a través de la Eucaristía, haciéndonos su propia carne y sangre, como esposo y esposa se convierten en una sola carne. Por lo tanto, las normas de cada una de nuestras relaciones deben ser la aceptación, el amor, el respeto mutuo y el servicio y, como fundamento de estos, el reconocimiento de la verdadera dignidad de cada miembro de Cristo. Nuestras decisiones en la vida familiar y en la vida parroquial deben guiarse por este alto ideal.

“*Esta enseñanza es difícil. ¿Quién la puede aceptar?*”. Fueron los discípulos de Jesús quienes se quejaron. Se sintieron ofendidos por el lenguaje de Jesús –comer su Carne y beber su Sangre para tener Vida eterna–, las imágenes y metáforas que Jesús utilizó en el discurso eucarístico. Esta era la manera dramática en que el Maestro decía que debemos aceptar totalmente, sin condiciones ni reservas, todo lo que Jesús nos dice. Los pensamientos y actitudes de Jesús, sus valores y su visión de la vida deben llegar a ser totalmente nuestros. Sobre todo, debemos identificarnos con Jesús en la ofrenda de su Carne y el derramamiento de su Sangre en la cruz, la expresión máxima del amor inefable de Dios por nosotros. Pero sin dar más explicaciones, Jesús simplemente los desafía a abrirse al don de la fe que Dios les ofrece: “*Nadie puede venir a mí si no se lo concede el Padre*” (v. 65). Jesús intenta ayudar a los seguidores restantes a dar un salto de fe, porque sólo con la fe podrán ver y comprender el triple misterio que les ha sido revelado, a saber, (1) la Encarnación (*Yo soy el Pan bajado del Cielo*, 6:41); (2) la redención (*el Pan que yo doy es mi Carne para la vida del mundo*, 6:51); (3) la Ascensión y glorificación (*el Hijo del Hombre ascenderá a donde estaba antes*, 6:62). Habiendo insistido anteriormente en que el creyente debe comer la Carne y beber la Sangre del Hijo del Hombre para tener vida eterna, Jesús ahora dice a los discípulos: “La carne no sirve para nada”. Pero “carne” aquí no es la Eucaristía. Más bien, “carne” significa sustento natural, suposiciones, actitudes y expectativas, que no pueden dar alimento espiritual. Y el “Espíritu” aquí significa el Espíritu Santo dador de vida que será dado a los creyentes después de la ascensión de Jesús al Cielo. La respuesta de Pedro a la pregunta de Jesús, “*¿También ustedes quieren irse?*” es la simple pregunta: “*Maestro, ¿a quién iremos? Tú tienes palabras de vida eterna*”. La pregunta refleja la decisión llena de fe, libre y de todo corazón de los apóstoles y la comunidad cristiana primitiva de seguir a Jesús en obediencia completa, aceptando y confiando.

Nosotros los cristianos hemos aceptado el desafío de seguir el camino de Cristo y hacer elecciones por Cristo, fortalecidos por el Pan que Jesús da y confiando en el poder del Espíritu Santo. El Pan Celestial y el Espíritu Santo nos darán el valor de nuestras convicciones cristianas para aceptar las enseñanzas de la Iglesia y enfrentar el ridículo, las críticas e incluso el aislamiento social por nuestra adhesión a principios cristianos sólidos en nuestras vidas. Sobre todo, debemos identificarnos con Jesús en su donación del Amor de Dios por nosotros, su Crucifixión, muerte y Resurrección, sellando la Nueva Alianza con toda la humanidad en Su Sangre, un don de Amor que se nos extiende en la Eucaristía con el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Jesús convirtiéndose en nuestro Alimento y Bebida espirituales. Que Dios los bendiga a todos. Amén.

Si usted fue abusado sexualmente por cualquier persona relacionada con la Diócesis, debe presentar su reclamo para que se reciba antes del 1 de octubre de 2024, o de lo contrario, se le prohibirá y excluirá para siempre hacer valer dicha reclamación contra la Diócesis.

Las reclamaciones basadas en actos u omisiones de la Diócesis que ocurrieron antes del 1 de abril de 2024, deben presentarse el 1 de octubre de 2024 o antes, incluso si dichas reclamaciones no están ahora fijas, liquidadas o ciertas o no se vencieron o se volvieron fijas, liquidadas o ciertas antes del 1 de abril de 2024.
